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Letter from the President

Grace, peace, and “Happy Spring” to all you amazing Women of the ELCA!

Registration begins at 8 a.m. with coffee hour, fellowship, etc. until worship begins at 9. The board decided to continue the anti-racism / indigenous people theme with a program by Bonnie Anderson and Sarah Nestingen from Westby Coon Prairie Church who have been involved in mission trips to the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation in South Dakota for the past 12 years. It will be interesting to hear what they have experienced and learned in a dozen years. I can’t wait to hear them!

Want to prepare your heart and mind for this challenging topic? Pastor Ben recommended a couple of books: **THE HEARTBEAT OF WOUNDED KNEE** and **THE 1619 PROJECT**. To that I’d add: **THE KILLERS OF THE FLOWER MOON** and **1491**. Steel yourself as you will view a rawer side of human nature.

An important aspect of any convention is the election of new ladies to lead us forward. This is a collaborative effort; nine women SHARE the job. It is NOT a one woman operation. Please prayerfully consider saying “yes” when a member of the nominating committee calls you, or simply volunteer! Introducing Rev. Dione Stepanek

Introducing the Synod's New Direction for Evangelical Mission and Assistant to the Bishop
– Rev. Dione Stepanek

Greetings friends! It is my delight to introduce myself to the WELCA ladies of the synod whom I hope to get to know through the impactful ministries you all participate in throughout the synod. I joined Bishop Felix Malpica as synod staff in mid-December, and have been off and running ever since. While I am new to the synod, it is already clear that this is a beautiful, wonderful synod, and I am already coming to love it and the ways that you all carry out God's mission in the world.

Before joining the staff of the La Crosse Area Synod, I served as a parish pastor in varied settings. I've served as associate pastor at a large, multi-staff congregation in Waupaca, Wisconsin, an interim pastor at a rural, two-point parish in central Wisconsin, and, most recently, as senior pastor at a medium-sized congregation in Boulder, Colorado. In an interesting way, those settings mirror the makeup of the synod that simply seems fitting and familiar.

While in seminary, I had the gift of being able to learn and grow in a less familiar setting while serving as an intern at the International Church of Bangkok, in Bangkok, Thailand – an international, interdenominational congregation with over 35 nationalities represented and the entire theological spectrum. It was a privilege to learn about the wideness of God's activity and grace through the experiences of others with their different cultural understandings and life experiences. To be in a group of people who are together for no other reason than their shared trust in God's loving promises offers a particular perspective on faith and life that cannot easily be forgotten.

As your Director for Evangelical Mission, I am excited to be able to bring some of my past experiences and draw on your stories to see what God is up to now in and through the La Crosse Area Synod. WELCA has always been deeply involved in tapping into the powerful movement of God in the communities and attending to the needs of our siblings throughout the world (sometimes in ways that are quite far ahead of the rest of the larger church). There are exciting ministry opportunities right in front of us all.

We are in a pivotal time in the church and the world at the moment. We all know that the way things had been done in the past no longer work the way they used to. The pandemic only accelerated those shifts that were already well on their way. However, while the ways in which we do ministry have and will change, the why behind it all remains constant. We are called to always ask ourselves "Why do we do this?" Why do we exist? Why does WELCA exist? Why are we church at all?

**And I'll give you a hint – the why isn't because we've always done it that way.
The why is Jesus!**

We exist to share the Good News of Jesus Christ – the Good News that when pain and brokenness looked as if it had won, Christ conquered death (the one thing we know to be final). Why do we do all that we do? Why do we pray and persist and continue on as church? We do it because that message matters in profound, life-giving ways.

God IS doing a new thing every single day, and I am excited to be on this journey with you all so that we can listen and find out how we can live it out together.

Two Resources for WELCA Groups

Women's History Month Bold Women Series

We celebrated Women's History Month with a three-part series on bold women of faith from our collective history. We explored the life of Emmy Carlsson Evald (1857-1946), the founder of the Women's Missionary Society of the Augustana Synod, by talking with her great-granddaughter Sharon Wyman who recently published a biography of Emmy.

We examined the life of Sister Emma Francis (1875-1945), the first woman of color to serve as a Lutheran deaconess. Sisters Noreen Stevens and Megan McClinton led the conversation and shared photos of Emma's life as a deaconess.

Our last segment covered the contributions of women in biblical interpretation who have been overlooked or ignored. The authors of *Voices Long Silenced: Women Biblical Interpreters through the Centuries*, Joy A. Schroeder and Marion Ann Taylor, shared the significant contributions of Sarah Trimmer, Maria Stewart, Harriet Beecher Stowe, Argula von Grumach, Walatta Petros, and Jarena Lee.

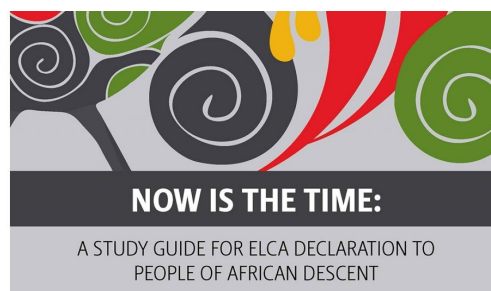


The Declaration of the ELCA to People of African Descent

"The Declaration of the ELCA to People of African Descent" is an acknowledgment of the church's complicity in slavery and the perpetuation of systemic racism. *Now Is The Time: A Study Guide for ELCA Declaration to People of African Descent* focuses on deepening understanding of that history and engaging white people in conversation on the meaning and impact of slavery and systemic racism. Participant materials are available in addition to the study guide.

From Glory into Glory: Reflections for Worship

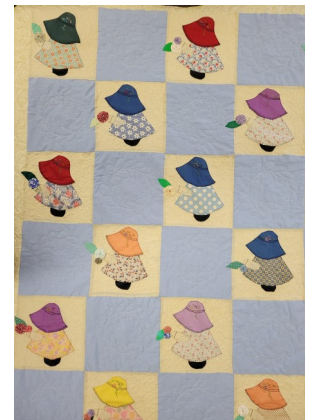
It is dark.

Quilts and Shawls for Peace

A Message on Ukraine from the Women of the ELCA

Lutherans who work with fibers often turn to their fabric or yarn when faced with calamity. It's calming to work with fibers, and productive outcomes (quilts or shawls) often go to those facing the calamity directly. It's no different with the Russian assault happening in Ukraine. Here are some ways you can employ fiber and make a positive impact on this developing humanitarian crisis. (Read through to the end to learn how you can offer financial support.)

Quilts and kits you've previously made are being sent to aid those directly impacted by the assault on Ukrainian people, Lutheran World Relief reports. When you're feeling helpless and don't know what to do, you can continue making quilts and assembling kits. LWR will need to replenish supplies, and you can make a positive contribution with your work. Maybe you can even invite someone new to the efforts.

Praying is always an appropriate response: prayers for those directly impacted, prayers for world leaders, prayers for peace and justice. Combine your prayer petitions and yarn by making prayer shawls or prayer squares. While your shawls and squares might not end up in the hands of a Ukrainian, they can benefit people closer to home. For patterns, do an online search for more information about prayer shawls and prayer squares or check with other fiber artists in your congregation or community.
